#### LAUNCHING OF RUIJ

On January 28<sup>th</sup>, the *Réseau universitaire intégré* jeunesse (RUIJ) was launched. The goal of this new network is to bring together all the partners working with youths at risk and their family, to put in common their expertise, research, programs and best practices.

All partners, youth centres as well as CSSS and research teams and any other organization working with youths at risk are invited to participate. The principle is simple: the more members of the network will have access to research results and expertise, the more youths and their families will benefit because they will receive support and interventions at the forefront of clinical and scientific knowledge.

The RUIJ already completed three projects. The first one is very relevant to us. It is the production by youth centres of a numerical collection of over 2000 documents produced by all youth centres on many subjects such as sexual abuse, conjugal violence, and neglect. At the present time, the website (www.ruij.qc.ca) is only available to youth centres staff, but will eventually be open to our partners.

The second project is the update of the university activities in youth centres. The third one facilitates access to specialized research ethics committees in the field of youth at risk and their family for organizations who do not have them, and where research activities take place to improve the quality of research within the organization.

The RUIJ is the result of a joint initiative from *Centre jeunesse de Montréal* and *Centre Jeunesse de Québec, instituts universitaires*. It is financed by the MSSS and supported by the ACJQ and the *Association québécoise des établissements de santé et de services sociaux*.
